

# History



## Livingstone - Kenilworth T.T.C

It is 1936, Lyndhurst Road in Kenilworth Cape Town. A nine year old boy Richard Maurice gets a ping pong set from his brother in law. They play on an oval dining room table and the seeds are sown for the development of a magnificent story that now unfolds.

Richard wanted to share his new found joy and soon invited the next door neighbours, the Johnson family, to experience the magic of the little celluloid ball. The Johnsons literally "slept over" as the addiction set in. The discomfort of the oval table caused the activity to move next door where the Johnsons had a much larger rectangular table. Over the next few months the Johnsons took the 7 day a week activity to another level with many friends being asked over to challenge the skills that the Johnsons had by then developed. The competitive bug caused great excitement which resulted in the Johnsons establishing the KENILWORTH TABLE TENNIS CLUB in 1937 in a garage especially built as the Club venue. The Club inter-acted with a few other groups, also formed into clubs, and in 1938 the Kenilworth TTC together with these other Clubs officially founded the fore-runner of the Western Province Table Tennis Union.

The Johnson Family and therefore the Kenilworth TTC was by far the dominant local force in table tennis and expanded the sport to such a degree that contact was made, via Western Province, with similar groups in other provinces which led to the formation of the South African Table Tennis Board at an inaugural meeting in Durban in 1948.

The first national championships of the SATTB was held in Cape Town in 1950. Leslie Koopman beat Richard Johannissen in the final to become the first South African Men's Singles Champion. Both players hailed from the Kenilworth TTC.

Other venues used by the Club were the Janet Bourhill Institute in Claremont, also known as JBI, and the Moravian School in Church Street Lansdowne in 1953. From here the Club moved to the Livingstone High School in Claremont where the History Teacher of the school, Miss Ray Carlier had formed the LIVINGSTONE TTC with a number of young female players. The two clubs decided to amalgamate thereby securing a well-balanced male/female membership. Therefore the name changed to the LIVINGSTONE-KENILWORTH TTC which came into being round about 1954/1955. The shortened form of the name, LIV-KEN, became synonymous with table tennis in Western Province. Leading Kenilworth TTC members at this stage were Richard Maurice, Jimmy Bartnicke and Leslie Koopman. Richard played major official roles at WP Union and SATTB levels (see profile on Richard Maurice).

The Livingstone High School was the club venue until the end of 1962. It was in September of 1962 that a 17 year old Standard 9 Livingstone High School student, Hasie Ismail, got to know about the Club. In February 1963 the Club moved to the residence of Ray Carlier in Warbrecht Road Lansdowne, into a double garage specifically fitted with top of the range lighting to accommodate table tennis. At this stage it is recorded that the club had 32 members, 90% of whom were ex-Livingstonians.

The Club enjoyed not only the use of the garage as a venue but also the freedom of Aunty Ray's home for its monthly meetings and preparation of the catering for its regular fixtures which was about three nights per week. The Club played here for 14 years until 1976 with only one table.

In 1976 two of the members, Hasie and Heather Ismail built their home in Grassy Park at 7 Elizabeth Road, with a dedicated table tennis room (also only one table). With table tennis being a winter sport there was often the discomfort of the floor being wet because of the cars (at Aunty Ray's home) and a dedicated table tennis venue became a preferred option to a garage. So when Hasie and Heather moved into their home in 1977, the club decided to move with them. Their home became known as "the Club" for the next 25 years as every activity of the club took place there (7 days a week) - meetings, fixtures, social events and fundraising ventures. It was here that the seven-day-a-week Junior Programme made the Club one of the leading junior clubs not only in WP but also in South Africa. Except for 1980 and 1984 Liv-Ken produced all the SA Junior Champions of the 80's into the 90's.

The turbulent 70' 80's and 90's saw Liv-Ken's involvement in the sport/political leadership in steering table tennis via the ethics of the South African Council on Sport (SACOS).

Up to about 1980 the club colours were a Bottle Green top with a Grey shorts or skirt. Having moved to Grassy Park there was an obvious growth of new members. The availability of Bottle Green became problematic and the club changed its colours to Red (top) and Black (shorts or skirt).

During the 50's 60's 70's 80's and into the 90's Liv-Ken provided most of the leadership figures of Western Province Union and the SATTB, and from 1996 onward for Western Province Table Tennis and the new SATTB.

In 1990 with the onset of political dissension within the "Old" SATTB and ALL other sport codes, there were splits nationally and provincially throughout the country. This gave rise to the formation of the South African Table Tennis Federation where once again the leadership figures came from the Liv-Ken TTC. In 1995 there were only four clubs left in the WPTTU. These were the Steenberg, Bishop Lavis, Stephanian and Liv-Ken Table Tennis Clubs. These clubs decided to go into amalgamation with the WP Table Tennis Board. At this stage Joe Ebrahim and Jasper Walters resigned their positions as Chairman and Secretary of WPTTU and under the chairmanship of the newly elected Hasie Ismail the four clubs amalgamated with the WPTT Board to form the current Western Province Table Tennis. This of course led to the dissolution of the WPTTU and the SATTB. In 1996 Hasie was elected as Chairperson of WPTT in which position he served until 2002.

From 1995 onward many new persons joined the club and many new members made themselves available for the official positions of the club. Unfortunately during this period records were no longer meticulously kept as in previous years. Individuals especially like the secretaries, recorded everything on their PC's and when these persons left the club some of our records left with them. The records of personal achievements of individuals from 1995 onward may not be fully reflected in this brochure. And we apologise for that.

Of immense significance that evolved from 1997 onwards is the format of current day championships. Here again Liv-Ken can claim credit for leading the way. Instead of an OPEN championship, Liv-Ken staged their Divisional Championships where entry was restricted to players of each division only. The club effectively ran 5 or 6 championships in that one week, during August of each year. The total entry of each Division was split into groups of 4 players, each group playing a round robin. The number 1 and 2 of each group would then advance into a straight Knock Out competition. Over the years this round robin to knock out format was adopted for all other club championships and also for the WP Open championships. The cherry on the top was when the SATTB adopted the same system for the SA Open. Once again, Liv-Ken had set the pace.

In the 70's Liv-Ken introduced feature events like "The 8 Plus 4" as well as the "Super 8 Invitation Tournament" this was always through the genius of Jasper Walters. In our 75th Anniversary year, Liv-Ken has once again brought in a new competition in the form of the SUPER 16 Double Eliminator as an official one night fixture. This was hailed by many including the players as the best event of 2012.

Post 1995 saw a decline in the standards of sport generally. This affected table tennis as well but Liv-Ken refused to take a step down and under the leadership of Hasie Ismail, maintained and consistently imposed their standards on the table tennis fraternity in general. We are indebted to those clubs who practised the same high standards and therefore made it easier to maintain.

In 2001 the club decided to move its playing venue to the Grassy Park Civic Centre to be able to put up more tables and therefore cater for more members. The circular shaped floor of the venue however was not very comfortable and in 2002 the club moved to the Rooikrantz Sport and Recreation Centre where we are able to provide up to nine tables. This is currently the Club's playing venue but the Club still considers the venue at 7 Elizabeth Road as its headquarters. In 2011 Liv-Ken was considered the biggest club in WPTT with 7 teams in the various leagues.

The club has always maintained high moral standards and good discipline. It has consistently striven to educate and foster the development of the running of the sport among all its members. This is borne out by members who joined the club when they were younger than 15 and currently run the club at a very high level. Here we can point out Grant Bailey (Secretary), Benjamin van der Ross (Junior Convenor), Adrian Hanslo, Mark Bredevelde and Brent Walters (all three previous treasurers), and Shedy Farouk who has become almost indispensable to the running of championships at all levels throughout the country.

The club has always recognised the contributions of individual members and introduced LIFE Membership in 1988 which it confers, from time to time, on members who deliver exceptionally high service to the club and the sport in general over long periods of time (Members who had been honoured by this accolade are Jasper Walters , Audrey Walters , Hasie Ismail , Brent Walters , Joe Ebrahim , Mark Bredeveltdt , Sheddy Farouk , Grant Bailey , Benjamin Vd Ross).

The club has served table tennis by providing officials for our provincial body as well as the SATTB over all its years. It has as its motto "ESPRIT DE CORPS" which means the animating spirit of a collective body as a regiment, and it is this which has kept the club going for the past 80 years. ALL the clubs that were present at the founding of the WPTTU in 1938 and the SATTB in 1948, are all gone many years ago, EXCEPT LIV-KEN TTC, a club that has stood the test of time. It has endured all the trials and tribulations of South African society always being at the helm of the development of our beloved sport.

To take leadership of a club with the stature of the Kenilworth TTC and subsequently the Livingstone-Kenilworth TTC was indeed a daunting task for those individuals who had the courage to fill the shoes of their predecessors. Without going into detail as to the dates and the time spans that they served we pay tribute to the Chairpersons that held office , in sequence , since the late 1950's until this our 80th year -2017. These are Richard Maurice, George Smith, Sefton Wicomb, Hasie Ismail, Simon Meyer, Hasie Ismail, Grant Bailey, and currently again Hasie Ismail. These Chairpersons have led the club over a period of the last ±65 years. Simon currently lives in East London, and the rest still here in Cape Town.

On occasion the club would stage feature events like "THE 8 PLUS 4" , the "SUPER 8 INVITATION TOURNAMENT"and the "SUPER16 DOUBLE ELIMINATOR . We can with pride look back upon players who have brought honour to our club on the table. These would fall into different categories and if anybody's name is omitted it would be due to the lack of proper records and we apologise for this :




## **Tribute to Richard Webster Maurice (1927 - 2017)**

As I related in the history of the club, Richard was 9 years old when he made the acquaintance with the magic little celluloid ball. His neighbours, the Johnson Family to whom he introduced the sport by far overshadowed him in developing the sport in his tender teenage years. Being still a child among the older original members of the Kenilworth TTC, he preferred enjoying his competitive table tennis as the captain of the Rosmead Primary School team.

Not much is recorded of Richard's very early playing career other than that he won the WP Junior Boys Single title in 1945. His claim to fame was not as a player but rather more as an administrator par excellence with leadership qualities that few could match. At Liv-Ken club level he is largely remembered as its Chairman with tremendous influence on all the other administrative positions in the development and education of other office bearers.

At Western Province level over the years he largely filled the positions of Chairman, Secretary, Selector, Team Manager and leader of delegations to meetings of the SATTB. He can claim to be the first WP Manager to have brought home the much coveted H Ismail Men's Interprovincial Shield in 1968.

At SATTB level he was the National Secretary from 1952 to 1956, and it was through his personal initiative during this period that his most important contribution resulted in the SATTB emerging as the FIRST non-racial South African National Sports body, to hold membership of an International Federation. He represented the SATTB in 1955 at the congress of the ITTF in Utrecht in Holland, and gained for the SATTB membership in good standing in 1957 thereby preventing the establishment SATT Union from having any international affiliation. He was a founding committee member of the ATTF in Cairo in 1961 and worked relentlessly on establishing contacts and relationships for the SATTB against the immensely powerful Apartheid forces. His tireless efforts were rewarded in 1967 when the SATTB was granted FULL membership of the ITTF.

We must from the outset mention that Richard had Ray by his side in every aspect of his contribution to the sport. Locally Richard and Ray made their home available for meetings and social occasions for both the club and WPTTU. Without a doubt, it was the club that mostly enjoyed the fruits of the passion that Richard and Ray had for table tennis.

Richard and Ray left South Africa in 1977 to settle in Melbourne Australia. On the 11th October 1997 the club conferred on both of them Life Membership of the club in recognition of their huge contribution to the club and table tennis in general. This was done, in their absence unfortunately at the official function of the club's 60th Anniversary.

In 2012 the club's 75th Anniversary, Richard was once again honoured by the club naming its Anniversary Championship "The Richard Maurice Super16 Double Eliminator". It was held on 13th October at the Livingstone High School on the date as closely available to Richards 85th Birthday which he celebrated on 24th October. We are proud to recognise Richard Maurice as The Father of Table Tennis in South Africa.

Sadly Richard passed away on the 18th Of July 2017.

### **Brief overview of PSFA**

PSFA is a registered non-profit organisation that addresses hunger in young learners attending primary, secondary and special needs schools as well as Orphaned and Vulnerable Children Centres (OVCs) and Early Childhood Development Centres (ECDs) and Technical and Vocational Education and Training Colleges (TVETs) in the Western Province.

Our Mission is to combat the prevalence of hunger in children attending schools and other developmental institutions, through school feeding and other developmental initiatives, while they are at school.

Our Vision is no more hungry school children.

PSFA's main aims are to reduce short term hunger, enhance children's ability to learn through school feeding and increase school attendance.

**PSFA has to date provided over 1.5 billion nutritious meals to underprivileged school children thus promoting a sound grounding for education, which is the key to everyone's future.**

#### **The Educational Institutions we serve**

PSFA currently provides daily nutritious cooked meals to a total of 27 117 learners at the following educational institutions in the Western Cape:

- 25 615 learners at 141 primary, secondary and special needs schools
- 412 children at 14 ECD centres
- 390 children at four OVC safe parks and
- 700 students at two TVET colleges

Over and above the ingredients supplied to each educational institution on our feeding programme, PSFA also provides gas stoves, gas bottles, gas when needed, pots, plates, eating spoons and cooking utensils.

PSFA empowers and trains members of the community, usually unemployed parents, to prepare and serve meals at each of the schools. PSFA provides each volunteer with a monthly stipend.

## **Kitchens at Schools**

Thanks to funding provided by donors, PSFA has also to date facilitated the building and supply of 124 kitchens at schools that had inadequate facilities to prepare cooked meals.

## **The Need for School Feeding**

According to a report compiled by the University of Cape Town's Children's Institute, three out of every four children in South Africa are living in poverty, with approximately 30% of the country's population experiencing food insecurity.

## **Cost Implications**

PSFA's school feeding programme is specifically structured to address hunger. It impacts positively on the learner's nutritional status. Each meal provided meets at least 33% of the learner's Recommended Daily Allowance (RDA). It costs R2.50 per learner per day for two meals – R450 per learner per annum.

## **Conclusion**

PSFA receives funding from many generous donors who have adopted a school and in doing so, contribute to the nutritional needs of learners. These donors include individuals, companies, trusts, foundations, privileged schools, NPO's, churches and clubs.

All the schools on our feeding programme are not included in the Western Cape Education Department's National Schools Nutrition Programme. PSFA undertakes to secure funding to ensure that these schools will be supported by our feeding programme.

PSFA believes that children should be given the opportunity to learn, grow, develop and achieve. Children cannot do all this without a nutritional meal. The provision of school feeding contributes significantly to these objectives. We foundation of our inspiration is from the statement, "you can't teach a hungry child."

## Profile Jasper Walters



Jasper Walters spent his youth playing table tennis at the Rosmead Primary School. Whilst playing at Rosmead, this left-hander won the WP junior singles title. At about the time of the Kenilworth and Livingstone amalgamation, Jasper joined the club and his presence from even his very early twenties, ensured a continuation of the Liv-Ken tradition of leadership and innovation for many decades to come.

Jasper's organisational skills were indeed a very difficult example to follow. His meticulous attention to detail and adherence to perfection were hallmarks of his character that set Liv-Ken rungs above other clubs and Western Province above other Unions. The walls of the Salt River Railway Institute, the Wittebome Civic Centre, the Athlone Civic Centre and indeed many other venues, echo the name of Jasper Walters, for the many events that he spearheaded at all levels. He set high and demanding standards that educated, informed and empowered many who had the courage and wisdom to work with and learn from him.

National events which can distinctly be attributed to Jasper's mastery is the 1968, 1982 and 1988 (SATTB 40th Anniversary) SA Open Championships. The SATTB's participation in the 1982 and 1988 SACOS Festivals owed its success to Jasper's leadership. Numerous WP and Liv-Ken Championships enjoyed his convenorship. Feature events like "The 8 Plus 4" and the "Super Eight Invitation Tournament" were the innovations of this mastermind.

Besides his organisational skills, his keen administration attributes saw him handling many portfolios, especially at Provincial and National level. Major positions that he occupied in Western Province over the years was that of the Chairman and the Secretary. In the late 80's he was elected as the Secretary of the SATTB, a position that he held up to the National Meeting in 1990 when the split in the SATTB and therefore the formation of the SATTF took place. Before this sad time for table tennis in South Africa, Jasper represented the SATTB as its Secretary at the Conference of the ITTF in Dortmund in 1989. He was also the Secretary of the Federation until its dissolution in 1995.

In 2001 the SATTB conferred Life Membership on Jasper. The same honour was refused for other nominated members for political reasons, and as a matter of principle, Jasper rejected the honour bestowed on him. He was supported by Hasie Ismail who took the same stance.

Although this article would seem to be about Jasper it is almost impossible to talk about Jasper and not to mention his late wife Audrey. It must be emphasised that in everything expressed above, Jasper had Audrey by his side, matching and assisting him every inch of the way. A sharper mind was difficult to find and she represented Liv-Ken at WP Meetings for many years.

Audrey had a strong and level-headed mind, with superior debating skills that stood Liv-Ken in good stead since the amalgamation years. She was a member of the Livingstone TTC at the time of the amalgamation. Jasper and Audrey, a unique couple indeed. The two children that was borne of their marriage bears testimony to this, Brent and Lee who both in their own rights developed into exemplary individuals of which their parents can justifiably be proud.

In 1988 when Liv-Ken decided to bestow Life Membership for the first time on some of their members, with extremely high and demanding criteria, Jasper and Audrey were two of the first three members to have this prestigious honour bestowed upon them. The third recipient was Hasie

Ismail. It must be mentioned here that in our 60th Anniversary brochure it is incorrectly mentioned that this award was bestowed in 1980. We correct that now - it was bestowed in 1988.

Audrey passed away in 1999. Jasper retired from table tennis in 1995. He still participates in all the social events of the club as a very special guest.

# Message from Life Member Brent Walters on the occasion of the Livingstone-Kenilworth Table Tennis Club's 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration



On behalf of the Livingstone Kenilworth TTC, I would like to welcome you all to the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration and the accompanying celebratory table tennis event called the Jasper Walters 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Liv-Ken Tournament named in honour of our oldest living life member Mr Jasper Walters.

Thank you to the executive of the Liv-Ken TTC for giving me the opportunity to say a few words.

As many of you will no doubt know, my family and I have a long history associated with the Liv-Ken Table Tennis club. My parents - my mother the late Audrey Walters and my father Jasper Walters grew up as young people in the club with both of them playing active roles in the sport for the better part of their lives and my sister Lee was a member of this club and went on to become a Western Province and South African Champion in the sport. I on the other hand was an active player for more than 20 years but dedicated most of my efforts to the technical and administrative aspects of the sport.

It will be fair to say that both my personal and professional development has been greatly influenced by my association with this Club. The way I see it, I speak for many when I say that Liv-Ken lives in the DNA of our socialization into the South African Society, it lives in our attempted role as an agent of change in that society, it lives in our understanding of what needs to be done to advance that society and it lives in our small contribution to the development of that society.

The nascent conceptualisation of this club was founded on the Oval dining-room table of the Maurice family in Kenilworth in 1936, when a young nine year old Richard Maurice was given a ping pong set and he and his neighbours the Johnsons engaged in the game and formally started the Kenilworth Table Tennis Club in the garage of the Johnsons, later amalgamating with players at Livingstone High school and forming the Livingstone Kenilworth Table Tennis Club – the oldest Table Tennis Club in Africa.

Richard Maurice (who passed away in Australia earlier this year at the age of 90) could be considered to be the pioneer of the sport in South Africa as he was to go on to become Chairperson of the Liv- Ken TTC, the Chairperson of WPTTU, a founding member of the SATTB in 1948, a founding member of the ATTF in Cairo in 1961 and through his efforts, table tennis was to become the first non-racial sport to enjoy full membership of an International Federation – the ITTF. In fact Richard was the first representative at the ITTF meeting in Utrecht Holland in 1955 – a seminal moment in the history of non-racial sport in South Africa

Richard Maurice can be considered to be the Father of Table Tennis in South Africa. His actions were the forerunner for many other sports who had similarly committed individuals who then grouped together to form the legendary organization of non- racial sport – SACOS – the South African Council on Sport – with its famous and popularly known slogan “no normal sport in an abnormal society” and its perhaps lesser known Double Standards Resolution – which was to shape the body politic of South African Non- Racial Sport.

This organization, together with its external partner SANROC was highly successful in isolating the apartheid state through its efforts. This had the impact of assisting to pressurize the apartheid authorities to the negotiating table to reach a settlement for a new democratic order.

Ladies and Gentleman this is the story of how the gift of one ping pong set was a catalyst on the road to assist to change the course of South African history. And we are all extremely proud to be associated with that journey.

In its 80 year history the club has had many notable leaders including Richard Maurice, Ray Carlier, Jasper Walters George Smith, Sefton Wicomb, Mark Bredeveltd and my mentor and friend Hasie Ismail to name but a few – there are many others. Hasie in particular is a leader from my period in this club and to him we owe a debt of gratitude for giving of himself for the development of others. He is still active and leading today – his active association with this club is now in its 54<sup>th</sup> year and still going strong.

The club has produced many SA and WP champions which are detailed in documentation elsewhere but its real strength has been in the development of hundreds of young people to become active and useful citizens in contributing to the building of a better South Africa.

Tonight we honour one such citizen and luminary of our club – Mr Jasper Walters

Personally he has been a great role model parent, father, friend and confidante. Indeed I have been privileged to have learnt many things from him... some (especially those involved in my professional life) may recognise behaviours like: attention to detail, demanding perfection, some stubbornness (my mother would call it the unstoppable force meeting the immovable rock!) - the right way to do things, organisational and administrative skills and so on but the most important lesson I have learnt from Jasper is about the values of integrity and

honesty – doing the right thing at the right time for the right reason - these values are sometimes in short supply when we need them most and they are most certainly often lacking in the world of sport.

The club salutes his legacy and thanks him for the contribution he has made in his life time.

To end off, I would like to tell you the story of Jadev Payang of the Mishing Tribe in Assam India. In 1979 as a 16 year old boy he noticed that the Brahmaputra river was claiming land each time it flooded and land was being washed away, so he decided that he needed to plant trees on a sand bar in the river to prevent this. He planted the tree saplings one at a time , day by day for a period of 38 years. Today the area is a forest of 1400 acres, home to thousands of species of life worthy of conservation...

The story of Jadev Payang is a metaphor for the story of Liv-Ken Table Tennis Club. The club is not planting trees nor building a forest but it is in the business of developing people one at a time in order to build a nation.

As the future beckons, we need to remain at the forefront of developing excellence in our sport, in producing champions and role models for others to emulate, but our bigger challenge is in getting our young people engaged in something constructive whether they are excellent at it or not... as long as we can create the passion, the desire, the belief, the focus and the dream, we will be doing our duty to build South Africa... one citizen at a time... this is the legacy of the Liv-Ken Table Tennis Club.

The executive members and those actively involved in playing, coaching, officiating and administration are building the human infrastructure of the nation junior by junior , person by person , step by step. Their journey is indeed our destination.

We salute all who have over the years made this club great... long may it continue into the future.

My congratulations on the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary , may the next 80 years bring prosperity , longevity and expansion for this great club.

## **INTERNATIONAL LINKS**

The membership of Liv-Ken has excelled in all aspects of the sport. Not only has the administration and the playing of table tennis been important to the membership but also the application of the rules of the sport.

In 1984 a number of individuals in the S.A.T.T.B. were candidates in the I.T.T.F.'s International Umpires Examination. A total of seven candidates passed. Six were from Western Province of which two were from Liv-Ken, namely, Brent Walters and Hasie Ismail. Unlike most other international umpires in Western Province, Brent and Hastie put their skills to good use over the years by making themselves available as referees for most of the championships at club level, the W.P.Open, and both the S.A.T.T.B. and S.A.T.T.F championships. In later years Liv-Ken was fortunate to acquire the membership of more persons who are qualified as International Umpires, such as Zaida Lyners and Genevieve Lentz.

Hasie has had the good fortune of exercising his skills by being sent by the S.A.T.T.B. to the 44TH World Championships in Manchester, England in April 1997. Here he umpired matches in both the world team event as well as the individual events. In subsequent years, both Genevieve and Zaida were exposed internationally on several occasions.

Jasper Walters was unfortunately one of the unsuccessful candidates in 1984. However, his skill in other areas, when he was secretary of the S.A.T.T.B., saw him representing the Board as a delegate to the conference of the I.T.T.F. in Dortmund, Germany in 1989. As has been mentioned elsewhere Richard Maurice represented the S.A.T.T.B. at the I.T.T.F. conference in Utrecht, Holland in 1955 and in at the founding meeting of the A.T.T.F in Cairo, Egypt in 1961. Kurt Petersen , Jessica Saunders , Tommy Lawrence , Ayesha Domingo and Darren Rodgers have represented South Africa in International and World Championship matches.

# Interview with Shane Overmeyer (9 Times SA Champion)

## 1. What racket and rubbers do you play with and why ?

Shane Overmeyer: I play with black Tenergy on Fh .Red with Donic Blue Fire .Blade with Yasaka Maxwood. I like to play with Maxwood because it gives me better feeling on the ball especially on service return ,short play



**2. What is your view on players moving to pimple rubbers .**Shane Overmeyer: My view players playing with pimples is that they bring a different dynamic to the game which can be good..but on the flipside its not good from a spectators point of view cause it can be a very difficult rubber to play against very technical especially if you dont understand how to play against it, it will look like you just play a simple ball in the net. The spectators dont always understand the spin and technicalities of the game.

## 3. In order to reach some success in the game what should aspiring players do or how much time should you spend training ?

Shane Overmeyer: To reach success in table tennis first of all you must be willing to put in the hours on and off the table. Try to start off with a good coach that can teach you the right basics. I was very fortunate in that regard. 2 hours a day of training or more is generally what is needed especially for table tennis which is a skill sport which always require more time spent on the table.

## 4. In your long career is there any match that stands out and why ?

Shane Overmeyer: I had a lot of good matches in my career but the one that stood out for me is at the Commonwealth games in 2010 in India. We played quarter finals against India. I played the first match against a much much higher world ranking player. He was up 2-0...with the home crowd which was filled to capacity and every time he wins a point they would cheer and laugh at me and that gave me more motivation to try harder.I managed to fight back and eventually won the match 3-2.....15-13 in the final game. That was my best match I played in my career. Also winning the African doubles titles with Theo Cogill in 2011 in Congo and ending 2nd in the singles.

## 5. Given the current state of table tennis in WP is there anything that you feel WPTT should focus on to improve the standards of the game ?

Shane Overmeyer:

- Have a training centre where our current top juniors train on a daily basis.
- Have more U15 and U18 training camps and tournaments with incentives so that they can feed the senior standard and ultimately create a good level .Because what's happening now is that when a good junior becomes a senior the level gap is way too big.
- Have more senior tournaments with incentives and get more coverage and marketing for the game.
- Have a professional league.

## **6. So what is the next big thing for the 9 times SA champ. ?**

The Shane Overmeyer Table Tennis Academy (SOTTA) is a project under the Blaqpearl Foundation that was established in 2016 which will be launching in January 2018 with Shane Overmeyer as the Operational Director.

The project is called "Breaking down barriers through table tennis". It is a series of coaching sessions where we use table tennis as a methodology to transfer lifeskills. The goal is to give the participants an alternative and show them that there is possibility if you work hard and believe in yourself.

U18 Youth is 84% of the population in South Africa will have 50% representation in our target group. They will become part of our current top junior players based in Cape Town , both male and female aged 14 - 22. The girl child is one of our top priorities since many girls in some of the marginalized communities experience many harsh challenges daily such as rape, violence, teenage pregnancy, substance abuse and more.

In addition we also plan to make a short documentary film to inspire the youth and others in future. The aim is to document their journey from day 1 until they graduate from the SOTTA Academy. This will also help with the promotion of the program to attract other table tennis players and create further awareness in the community about the sport.

Thus the outcome of the project is to make these young people responsible citizens. Also to make them confident young men and woman so they can learn to take challenges head on and overcome them. The participants should be proud of their talents and know that they have the relevant support to reach their true and full potential. SOTTA is able to provide our current top juniors with a space where they can access high performance coaching from Shane Overmeyer through the Academy. The main goal is to get them better prepared for international competition. The HPC has closed down a few years ago and currently there are no other centres, or structures that provide the expertise for our top junior talents.

## **7. How excited are you about playing in the Liv-Ken 80th Anniversary Tournament**

Shane Overmeyer :

I'm very excited and it's a very big honour for me to be part of this historical event and celebrate with the oldest club in Africa and I am looking forward to some tough competition.
